Combo Classes- Tan Tap Shoes {Capezio MaryJane #3800 (Caramel) or Bloch #302 (Tan)} and Light Blue leotard. Blue Skirt Optional.

Clogging, Hip Hop, Jazz, Liturgical, and Lyrical, Hip Hop students should wear a black leotard or fitted shirt with black jazz shorts, capris, or leggings. Hair must be secured away from the face.


